2024 in Review

Humbled by the prominent role we play in the health of Kansas City, we're mindful that our patients benefit from each of our successes. We are proud of the difference we made in 2024, including:

- Saint Luke's Muriel I. Kauffman Institute for Women's Cardiovascular Research was established. The Institute is the first of its kind, dedicated to studying the unique aspects of heart conditions in women. Its goal is to narrow the sex-specific research gaps in both prevention and treatment of cardiovascular disease.
- Saint Luke's Marion Bloch Neuroscience Institute, in partnership with the University of Missouri-Kansas City School of Medicine, launched the first Neurosurgery Residency Program at Saint Luke's. The program will allow residents to learn the full spectrum of elective and emergency surgical interventions for neurological conditions.
- Saint Luke's Cancer Institute offered National Cancer Institutesponsored clinical trials and industry-led studies.
- Saint Luke's Mid America Heart Institute developed an artificial intelligence algorithm to identify patients who can benefit from left atrial appendage occlusion procedures, such as the Watchman® device, which helps prevent blood clots and strokes in people with atrial fibrillation.
- Saint Luke's Hospital of Kansas City received its fifth Magnet® designation. This prestigious recognition, awarded by the American Nurses Credentialing Center, highlights the hospital's nursing and patient care excellence. Achieving five consecutive Magnet designations is a rare feat, accomplished by fewer than 2% of hospitals worldwide.
- Saint Luke's East Hospital was recognized as one of the best hospitals for maternity care by U.S. News & World Report.
- Saint Luke's North Hospital opened its Comprehensive Cancer Program, expanding Saint Luke's Cancer Institute's footprint in the Northland.
- Saint Luke's South Hospital named the Lloyd & Sue Ann Hill Family Cardiovascular Imaging Center.



Carrying on the Kauffman Legacy

Saint Luke's Muriel I. Kauffman Institute for Women's Cardiovascular Research

In 1961, Muriel Kauffman sat at a board room table at Marion Laboratories and did more than hold her own against the men across from her. She championed the development of many pharmaceuticals that improved the heart health of the men in her life.

Muriel's father died of a heart attack at 50. Her first husband died of a heart attack at 50. And his father also died of heart disease in his early 50s.

Muriel's passion to advocate for a healthy heart came from her own loss and her resolve to affect change. And she was going to do it for women.

Heart disease is the leading cause of mortality in women in the U.S., causing 1 in 3 deaths each year, and more deaths than all forms of cancer combined. Yet, historically, women have been underrepresented in cardiovascular research because of barriers in enrollment, and the belief that heart disease was a "man's disease." Today, the percentage of women enrolled in drug and device studies is still around 30%, on average.

Carrying the same dedication and resolve as her mother, Julia Irene Dennie-Kauffman is helping a new generation of women receive the specialized care they need.

"If my mother were here," Julia said, "I know she would want to invest in those patients to know their names, their faces, and their stories. The stories that make us cheer, the ones that make us cry, and the ones that make us mad."

Saint Luke's Mid America Heart Institute

Saint Luke's Mid America Heart Institute and Saint Luke's Foundation recently announced the creation of Saint Luke's Muriel I. Kauffman Institute for Women's Cardiovascular Research. The Institute is the first of its kind, dedicated to studying the unique aspects of heart conditions in women with the goal of narrowing the sex-specific research gaps both in prevention and treatment of cardiovascular disease.

Founded in 1994, the Women's Heart Center is recognized as the first center of its kind in the U.S. to take a proactive role in publicly addressing the unique aspects and challenges related to women's heart health.

With the support of a \$10 million endowed fund from the Muriel McBrien Kauffman Family Foundation and other generous donations, the Institute for Women's Cardiovascular Research will build upon Saint Luke's Muriel I. Kauffman Women's Heart Center's work with an expanded team of dedicated clinician-investigators and initiatives.

"From my mother, I learned to be brave—to stand up and to speak up," Julia said. "To champion for women and for the men who love them."

Through the Heart Center with her mother's name, Julia hopes to bring awareness and understanding to the community about women's heart disease.

"It's how we honor each patient's struggle, each caregiver's dedication," she said. "And it's how we make a difference."

From Donor Recipient to Donor

Pam and Jim Eaton

Decades ago, Pam Eaton was diagnosed with systemic lupus erythematosus (SLE), a condition that would shape her health and medical care for the rest of her life.

Pam's challenges mounted when she was diagnosed with Budd-Chiari syndrome and cirrhosis, both caused by anti-phospholipid antibodies linked to SLE. Her gastroenterologist warned that a liver transplant might be necessary within five to 10 years.

In 2003, Pam's medical team grew to include a transplant specialist to closely monitor her condition. By 2019, Pam was diagnosed with hepatocellular carcinoma, leading to a trans arterial chemoembolization (TACE) procedure, followed by targeted radiation to combat the cancer. This set the stage for a liver transplant.

On Jan. 15, 2020, Pam received the life-changing call that a compatible organ was available. The Eatons rushed to Saint Luke's Hospital of Kansas City, where Pam underwent a successful transplant surgery the next day. The transplant team's exceptional care was pivotal in Pam's recovery, allowing her to return to a normal lifestyle. On Jan. 16, 2025, the Eatons celebrated the five-year anniversary of Pam's transplant, a milestone of hope and perseverance.

Despite the challenges of hospital stays, the compassionate staff at Saint Luke's made Pam's and Jim's experience as comfortable as possible.

Their journey changed their perspective on health care and inspired them to give to Saint Luke's Hospital Liver Transplant Program.

"We cannot overstate our appreciation for the care, treatment, and consideration we have received from Saint Luke's," Jim shared. "As we approach our eighth decade of life, we enjoy good health and quality of life largely because of their care. We believe even small contributions can accumulate, and we encourage others to consider the excellent care they receive, and the investment needed to continually improve it."

This vision ignited the Flynns' excitement to create the Saint Luke's Cardiovascular Innovation Endowed Fund, which helps fuel groundbreaking innovations within cardiovascular surgery.

A Journey of Hope: Elsie's Story

When Elsie Matthys was just two days old, her life took an unexpected turn. The nurses and her pediatrician at Saint Luke's Hospital of Kansas City discovered severe congenital heart defects. She would need openheart surgery to survive—and that was only the beginning.

At just five months old, Elsie faced another life-altering setback: a stroke. Her parents, Molly Menser, DO, and Brian Matthys, DO, were determined to find the very best care. After exploring therapy programs throughout Kansas City, they walked into Saint Luke's Hospital The Children's SPOT—and immediately knew they had found something special.

From the start, the therapists at The SPOT became part of their extended family. They met every Wednesday morning, a time when both parents could attend each appointment. Through a deeply personalized plan, Elsie's team of occupational, physical, and speech therapists helped her achieve milestones that once seemed impossible: sitting, rolling, crawling, and eventually walking. She learned to pick up small toys and finger foods. Later, she mastered skipping, tying her shoes, pumping her legs on a swing—and now, she's learning to type on a keyboard.

Beyond the milestones, Elsie developed coordination, sensory processing skills, and the confidence to take on the world. "Elsie thrived from the moment we walked into SPOT," Dr. Menser shared. Starting with weekly therapy at just five months old, Elsie later joined The SPOT's developmental preschool and continued weekly visits for years. Now in fourth grade, she still benefits from occupational therapy as part of her school day.

After a decade—and nearly 600 Wednesdays—Elsie is a vibrant, joyful big sister. She loves ice skating, swimming, gymnastics, soccer, and reading. Her resilience and zest for life are a living testament to the care and community she found at The SPOT. And her two younger siblings, William and Marella, have benefited from services there, too.

For Dr. Menser and Dr. Matthys, supporting The SPOT is personal. They know firsthand what a difference it makes, and their passion is rooted in ensuring other families can access the same lifechanging support. Through their advocacy and generosity, they are helping more children achieve their fullest potential—and reminding every family that even in the hardest chapters, there is still hope, joy, and healing.
