# **Culinary Corner**



The first Thanksgiving in 1621 was a harvest celebration that brought the Pilgrims and the Wampanoag tribe together. The Wampanoag had helped the Pilgrims adapt to their new environment and taught them how to farm the land. In return, the Pilgrims invited the Wampanoag to join them for a feast to celebrate the harvest.

Corn was a central part of this feast. The Wampanoag had taught the Pilgrims how to plant and care for corn. Corn has since become an integral part of the Thanksgiving tradition, a reminder of the importance of community and the sharing of food.

Here at the RLC, we strongly encourage residents to come together for meals in the dining room. Residents who eat together not only consume more nutrition, but often, new friendships grow while sitting around the table together. We hope you will enjoy this corn recipe around your table.

#### Scalloped Corn

### **Ingredients**

#### Filling

- 1 16-ounce can creamed corn
- 2 16-ounce cans kernel corn, drained
- 1 cup milk
- 1 egg, well beaten
- 1 cup cracker crumbs (Ritz<sup>®</sup> or similar style)

- 2 Tbsp. green pepper, chopped
- 3/4 tsp. salt
- ¼ tsp. pepper

#### Topping

- 2 Tbsp. butter
- ½ cup cracker crumbs (Ritz<sup>®</sup> or similar style)

#### Directions

- 1. Preheat oven to 350°. Grease casserole dish.
- 2. In a large bowl, combine corn, milk, egg, 1 cup cracker crumbs, green pepper, salt, and pepper. Mix well.
- 3. Pour mixture into casserole dish. Dot top with butter and sprinkle with remaining ½ cup cracker crumbs.
- **4.** Bake 30-40 minutes, until top is browned and corn is bubbling around the sides.

# Starting Hospice Sooner Rather Than Later

Many families put off thinking about hospice care until the very end of life. It's a common misconception that hospice is only for the final days, but that's not the case.

A person can become eligible for hospice when a physician certifies a terminal illness and estimates a life expectancy of six months or less. Patients

and their families must also be ready to prioritize comfort over continuing curative treatments.

An early admission to hospice gives more time for the hospice care team to get to know the patient and their family and understand what matters most, without feeling rushed or pressured to make quick decisions. An earlier admission also allows time to develop a thorough, individualized care plan that offers many advantages, including:

- Medications and therapies that can be adjusted for better pain and symptom control
- More time to acquire necessary medical supplies, such as a hospital bed or wheelchair
- Improved quality of life over several months, with less stress and anxiety
- Bereavement support for families prior to their loved one's passing in addition to support following death
- Fewer hospital admissions that make it more likely for the patient to spend their final hours at home surrounded by loved ones

Hospice is a service that benefits both the patient and their family. When utilizing hospice services earlier in the process, family caregivers can receive helpful tools and education from their hospice care team, ensuring they feel supported along the way.

Hospice is covered by Medicare, Medicaid, VA benefits, and most private insurance plans. It's important for patients to discuss disease progression and overall quality of life goals with their provider, and to ask for information on all resources and options available.

Saint Luke's Home Care & Hospice serves patients in 11 counties in Kansas including Allen, Anderson, Bourbon, Coffey, Franklin, and Linn. # Resident Spotlight: Darrel Hawk



Darrel Hawk grew up on a farm south of La Harpe, the fifth of 10 children. He attended elementary schools in Carlyle and La Harpe, graduating from lola Senior High School with the class of 1964.

Darrel joined the U.S. Navy shortly after high school where, because of his last name, he earned the nickname "Buzzard," later shortened to "Buzz."

By December of 1964, he was stationed aboard a naval warship, the USS Frank Knox. The crew completed several training missions before heading to Vietnam, where they provided naval gunfire and coastal patrol in support of the ongoing conflict. On July 18, while sailing to Taiwan, the Frank Knox became stuck on the Pratas Reef in the South China Sea. The ship's crew, along with other support units, worked day and night to save the vessel. After 38 days of uncertainty, the ship was finally freed and towed to Kaohsiung, Taiwan, before being transferred to a facility in Japan for repairs.

"I'd do it all over again if I was 18," he says.

Discharged in 1968, Darrel moved to Spring Hill, where he met and married his wife, Jeanette, and the couple raised two daughters. He found work welding and building trucks for coal mine operations but particularly enjoyed the 20 years spent as a driver for UPS.

Before retiring, Darrel and Jeanette moved to Wellsville, where they spent a lot of time with their daughters, Heather and April, and three grandkids. Jeannette passed away in 2018.

The following year, Darrel reconnected with Charyl, an old high school sweetheart, on Facebook. The pair enjoy going out to eat, attending school reunions, and taking trips together. A particularly memorable excursion was to Albuquerque, New Mexico, in 2021 when Darrel and Charyl attended a USS Frank Knox Reunion. That year, Darrel received a "Reef Runner" lifetime membership from the reunion organization.

Darrel was later honored with an invitation to join a Kansas Honor Flight with the Southern Coffey County Honor Flight hub. He was also presented with a Quilt of Valor from a quilting group in Yates Center, a prized possession.

Since moving to the RLC, Darrel has met several other veterans and has reconnected with another Iola classmate, Grace.

Darrel is a jokester who likes watching Westerns and solving word search puzzles out on the patio, and has gone on a couple of outings with other residents.

We sure enjoy Darrel's fun personality and are so glad to have him here at the RLC!
